Serafin String Quartet Announces Time Change to 4:00 p.m. for January 20 Concert at the University of Tulsa

(Wilmington, Del.) January 4, 2018 - <u>Serafin String Quartet</u> announces a *NEW* start time of 4:00 p.m. for its upcoming concert at the University of Tulsa on Saturday, January 20.

The Quartet travels to Oklahoma this month for a concert tour featuring performances at <u>From the Edge Chamber Music Series</u> (Norman) on **January 18 at 7:00 p.m.**; <u>Oklahoma State University</u> (Stillwater) on **January 19 at 7:30 p.m.**; and <u>University of Tulsa</u> (Tulsa) on **January 20 at 4:00 p.m.**, where the Serafins will also present a master class.

Serafin String Quartet violinist <u>Kate Ransom</u> reunites with long time friends, pianist <u>Stephanie Shames</u> and violinist <u>Hal Grossman</u>, for a performance of **Chausson Concerto in D Major for Violin, Piano and String Quartet, Op. 21** on January 18. The French composer enjoyed major success with the premiere of this work, referred to as one of the chamber music repertoire's best-kept secrets, in 1892.

Other tour repertoire includes **Haydn String Quartet in G Minor, Op. 74, No.3 "Horseman,"** the 'galloping' finale theme has given rise to its nickname; **Still Danzas de Panama** for string quartet, a delightful set of four movements each drawing from the colorful dance styles from Panama, Central America and Africa; and **Mendelssohn e minor Op. 44, No. 2**, a work filled with infectious energy and elegant lyricism.

About Serafin String Quartet

Hailed for "silken finesse and gritty vibrancy" by *Gramophone Magazine* and for "playing with style and sophistication" by *The Strad Magazine*, Serafin String Quartet debuted at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in 2004 and has consistently received superlatives in the press and ovations by audiences around the nation. The Quartet's highly acclaimed Naxos (2013) release featuring world premiere recordings of early chamber works by Pulitzer Prize-winning composer Jennifer Higdon was listed as "Top 10 Classical Albums in 2013" by Philadelphia's City Paper. The Quartet's debut recording on Centaur (2010) is an "American Tapestry" of works by American composers and composers influenced by American sounds, including Barber, Dvorák, Gershwin and William Grant Still. Featured by Strings Magazine for innovative concert programming, Serafin String Quartet has been applauded at performances around the nation. The Quartet serves as Quartet in Residence at the University of Delaware and takes its name from master violin maker, Sanctus Serafin, who in 1728 crafted the violin currently played by SSQ violinist Kate Ransom.
