(Wilmington, DE) September 1, 2015 - Cabrini College presents Serafin String Quartet for a free performance on Sunday, September 20 at 3:00 p.m. Following recent critical acclaim for their recent recording (Naxos 2013), named Top 10 Classical Albums of 2013 by Philadelphia's City Paper, the Delaware-based Serafin String Quartet has received ovations by audiences around the nation.

The concert program will feature Panamanian Dances by William Grant Still from the Quartet's debut recording (Centaur Records 2010), a delightful set of four movements each drawing from the colorful dance styles from Panama, Central America and Africa; String Quartet No. 6 by Bela Bartok, a deeply expressive and emotional string quartet composed in 1939 at the beginning of World War II; and String Quartet in G Minor by Edvard Grieg, a behind the scenes tour of Norway's most celebrated composer.

Serafin String Quartet's world premiere recording featuring early chamber works by award-winning composer Jennifer Higdon will be released by Naxos on July 30, 2013. The Quartet's debut recording (Centaur Records 2010) was hailed by The Strad Magazine for "playing with style and sophistication" and the American Record Guide for "combining true rhythmic precision, beautiful intonation, and beautiful articulation with an excellent sense of balance and deeply satisfying musical phrasing." Serafin String Quartet has been applauded by audiences around the nation, including sellout crowds at repeat performances in New York City's Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall. The Quartet serves as Quartet in Residence at the University of Delaware and takes its name from master violin maker, Sanctus Serafin, who in 1728 crafted the violin currently played by Kate Ransom.
